
TWBC hosted judges from South-and-South-East in Bloom and Britain in Bloom on




A new event for the Friends, A Walk In The Park took place in Dunorlan recently and, led by Chair Siobhan and

Stories were related of the Troops who were served afternoon tea at the main house in 1940, with a letter from Mr Collins (maybe Carteret) to Mrs Brown from the Nevill Bakery who provided the delicious food.

Members of the appreciative audience suggested a second event which would

take in the Victoria Cross Grove side of the park and this is being considered for next year.

The Friends hosted a **Pond Dipping** event during June. Fortunately the weather was glorious and pupils from Barnardo's Schools were able to enjoy the event.

Pond dipping is an outdoor event where individuals, usually children, use nets to explore the little creatures living in the shallows of a pond.







Ten children from Barnardo's schools, supervised by adults, spent time catching, looking at, noting and then carefully replacing, any creatures they found. Nothing sensational was caught, but there were lot of little wriggly things! The event was led by Scott Hudson and a colleague from Kent High Weald Partnership (KHWP) so a big thank you to them for making it so enjoyable.

Meadows Schools, one in Southborough and one in Tunbridge Wells, believe that every child is unique and deserves a personalised education which acknowledges their strengths, challenges and interests. They are proud of their rich history with Barnardo's and are excited to work with their students, parents/carers and community partners to create a future filled with promise and possibility.

The students spend time in the park, when they can, helping out with jobs such as litter-picking and tidying up, which helps the regular staff and volunteers enormously.





Another new Friends' event, the Model Boats exhibition recently was a success despite the weather not looking good. It did settle down by lunchtime though so Trev and Phil arranged their stall by the Halls Hole Road jetty. Model RNLI Lifeboats were on show with various items of RNLI kit. 


cakes and wine, with soft drinks for the children. This was a new event for the Friends and it has already been booked in for July next year when there could be other surprises!



A small songbird with a white cheek; black cap, throat and collar; single white wingbar and small black bill. The juvenile has light yellowish cheeks, a dull blackish cap and paler underparts than adults.



BAT WALKS - JULY AND AUGUST

Both Bat Walks sold out, with several new members joining the Friends. The walks were led by David Scully from Kent Bat Group and Scott Hudson from Kent High Weald Partnership. Fascinating pieces of information were heard about the bats' life expectancy and how each species uses different frequencies, what they eat etc.

There was a spot on the first walk where bats were seen but not heard due, David explained, to not hunting so no echolocation.

Daubenton's bats flew low

over the lake, and there were many!



Bees and butterflies are aplenty in our park, but they are also under threat as their vital habitats disappear. Pollinators will naturally hibernate, rest or shelter within plants or cracks in buildings, but with the modern change in land use, this is not always possible, especially in large swathes



parks, countryside or even gardens. Butterfly Conservation warns that half of Britain's 58+ resident species are under threat of extinction due to the loss of natural habitats and other factors. A study carried out by UK Centre for Ecology and Hydrology claims a third of our wild bees and hoverflies are in decline.

Something to ponder on seriously for the future????
